The first Board of Trustees meeting for the 2022-2023 school year was held on Thursday August 25, 2022. Trustee Boymook was acclaimed as chair and Trustee Holowaychuk was acclaimed as vice-chair.

The appointments of trustees to various committees will be approved at the September Board meeting

RESERVE SPENDING

The Board of Trustees approved the recommendation to ask the Minister of Education for permission to access Division reserves. Specifically, Elk Island Public School will ask to use \$2.2 million—\$1 million from operating reserves and \$1.2 million from capital reserves—to cover the costs for needed repairs to Salisbury Composite High's stormwater drainage system. To minimize school distributions, if approved, the work will take place during school break periods, starting summer 2023.

SCHOOL COUNCIL GRANT

Message from COSC Chair Lesley Williams:

Alberta Education is providing school councils with a \$500 School Council Engagement Grant. Those school councils interested in accessing funding must meet <u>Alberta Education's School</u> <u>Council Engagement Grant Criteria</u>, which essentially means opportunities that help build capacity and strengthen engagement.

To reduce the administrative burden for the deployment of the grant money, school councils can make their requests through the EIPS COSC Chair, by filling out and submitting the online <u>School Council Engagement Grant Request Form</u>. School councils can also work collaboratively with other school councils to pool funds for added value. All submissions that meet the grant criteria will be approved and announced at the COSC meeting during the "For Information" section, on a monthly basis. EIPS will then complete the activity payment on behalf of the school council—simply submit the invoice to <u>finance.submissions@eips.ca</u> and cc <u>Emma Small</u>.

EIPS THREE-YEAR ENGAGEMENT PLAN

Superintendent Mark Liguori discussed the <u>EIPS Three-Year Engagement Plan</u>. The discussion outlined four projects the Division is undertaking to identify areas EIPS can improve operations to best serve students, including programming and school capacity considerations.

NEW CURRICULUM AND ASSESSMENT TOOLS

Associate Superintendent Sandra Stoddard spoke about resources the Division has created for the new curriculum and the assessment tools being used for the school year. **New Curriculum:**

The Board allocated funds to continue our Division's efforts around building teacher capacity to successfully implement the new curriculum in the 2022-23 school year. A group of seven teachers were seconded to develop high quality unit plans assessments and resources in English Language Arts (K-3), Mathematics (K-3) and Physical Education and Wellness (K-6). This team will continue developing resources and offering professional learning opportunities for teachers to collaborate and refine their own planning processes for the new curriculum—using both Board and Alberta Education resources allocated for the 2022-23 school year. Additionally, in the summer, a group of French Immersion teachers worked to ensure EIPS' newly developed resources were translated into French.

Assessment Tools:

Alberta's government has introduced mandatory literacy and numeracy screening assessments for all students in grades 1 to 3, beginning this school year. EIPS will also assessing current Grade 4 students to support the Division's application for extended learning loss funding from the province. All EIPS students, grades 1-4, will participate in these assessments—grades 2-4 students started in September, Grade 1 students start in January 2023. Schools will use results of the assessments, and STAR results, to plan and guide intervention programming throughout the school year, as needed.
